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## 3 What Is Apologetics?

## Meaning

- Apologetics comes from the Greek word apologia meaning "a defense," "a reasoned argument"
- "Apologetics is the rational defense of Christianity. Christian apologists use reason and evidence to present a convincing case for Christianity, challenge unbelief, expose errors, and defend the message of the gospel." Pat Zukeran, The Apologetics of Jesus
- The heart of apologetics is not about winning a debate.
- The heart of apologetics is about removing objections that cloud people's minds to allow them to clearly understand the good news leading to eternal life.

# 4 The Apologetics of Paul

## Meaning

- Paul is often looked to as a model for apologetics
- Paul used the word twice in Philippians:
  - -for you are all partakers with me of grace, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. Phil. 1:7
  - -I am here for the defense of the gospel Phil. 1:16

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### 5 The Apologetics of Paul

### Meaning

- He encouraged us to defend the gospel as well
  - -"Conduct yourselves with wisdom toward outsiders, making the most of the opportunities. Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you should answer everyone." Col. 4:5-6
  - -"I should hear that you are standing firm in one spirit, with one mind, by contending side by side for the faith of the gospel, and not being intimidated in any way by your opponents." Phil. 1:27-28

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### 6 Peter: A Leader in Apologetics

### Meaning

- Peter is often thought of as the brash fisherman whose mouth was always several steps ahead of his brain.
- Peter demonstrated himself a leader in effective apologetics
  - -Recognized Jesus as the Christ early on. When others doubted, Peter declared, "To whom shall we go (Jesus)? You have the words of eternal life." John 6:68
  - -The primary spokesperson presenting a reasoned argument for the gospel before the crowds, the Jewish authorities and the first Gentile converts.

- Does Peter say "Don't think about this topic beforehand. Instead, just wait for the question and let the Holy Spirit speak through you"?
- What can we do to be ready?
  - -Think about moving someone from a side topic to the main event: the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ
  - -Know why we are sure the death and resurrection is a real historical event.
  - -Know the stumbling blocks prevalent around you.

# 14 Always Be Ready

### **Practice**

What can we do to be ready?

- -Think about the aspects different types of people would need to hear to begin to focus on the resurrected Lord. What stumbling blocks were they raised with in their culture?
- -Have a clear testimony of how faith in Christ has changed your life now and for eternity
- -Practice by talking/role playing with fellow Christians
- -Don't worry about tearing down their arguments. Focus on lifting up the truths of the gospel.

## 15 To Make a Defense (apologia)

### **Practice**

- Any defense should focus on the resurrection
  - -"If you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord and believe in your heart God raised him from the dead, you shall be saved." Rom 10:9
- This is not an argument or a debate
- Adjust the topic asked to make sure it is true
  - -"Why do you think I should worship your Western god?"

# 16 To Make a Defense (apologia)

#### **Practice**

- Reword their question to a valid question about our faith
  - -I don't worship a Western god. I worship Jesus the creator of the universe and only true God. Is your question really, why do I believe Jesus is God and your gods are not truly gods.

## 17 To Make a Defense (apologia)

### **Practice**

- If possible, quickly make them understand that their question is answered by answering these two:
  - -Why did Jesus die for us if He was already God?
  - -Was Jesus really resurrected from the grave to conquer death for us?
- His death shows us that we can never be righteous enough to earn a place with a holy God

## 18 To Make a Defense (apologia)

#### **Practice**

- Give a defense for the resurrection being a real event
- Ask them if they want to learn more about what Jesus did for us.

### 19 With Gentleness and Respect

#### Dractice

- To give a defense of your faith is a divine opportunity.
- You are interacting with a soul who desperately needs Jesus.
- Your objective is not to beat the other person into submission but rather to gently lead them into an understanding of the gospel.

## 33 The Hindu Transition

- Key Answer: God is holy and cannot overlook our sin. Because of His great love, He came to earth to take our sins upon Himself, offer forgiveness and rise from death to give us eternal life.
- Key Follow up: Can I explain to you why I believe Jesus is our resurrected savior?

## 34 Conclusions

- Peter and Paul both urge us to be prepared to give to a defense of the gospel
- The ultimate purpose is to "destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God" (2<sup>nd</sup> Cor 10:5) with the truth of the gospel
- For that purpose, we need to be sure we have a strong grasp of the evidence for the physical and spiritual reality of the resurrection of Christ.
- Sometimes it is worthwhile to discuss other topics with an unbeliever over the origins of life, the source of suffering, and other topics.
